Magi

Introduction:

The Magi – a mysterious group of men who are traditionally seen at the nativity as three men, ornately dressed and riding on camels to offer baby Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. If we pay careful attention to these men, we see people who are first alerted to something different by looking at the stars, but eventually respond to God, revealed to them as a baby, in extravagant worship and gifts. These men have traveled anywhere from 400-700 miles to seek the One who would be born "King of the Jews." This journey would have taken them 2-4 months' time, and upon arrival, they were prepared to worship him.

C.J. Ryle writes, "The conduct of the wisemen is a striking example of faith. They believed in Christ when they had never seen him — but that was not all. They believed in him when the scribes and Pharisees were unbelieving — but that again was not all. They believed in him when they saw him a little infant on Mary's knee and worshiped him as a king. This was the crowing point of their faith. They saw no miracles to convince them. They heard no teaching to persuade them. They beheld no signs of divinity and greatness to overawe them. They saw nothing but a newborn infant, helpless and weak, and needing a mother's care like any one of us. And yet when they saw that infant, they believed that they saw the divine Savior of the world."

May God give us the grace to respond to Jesus Christ, the newborn King, in such a way.

- 6. Contrast King Herod's response to the birth of Christ, the newborn King (Matthew 2:15-16) with the response of the Magi.
- 7. How are you challenged or encouraged to worship Christ this Christmas season?

- 2. What have you learned about the world?
- 3. What have you learned about yourself?
