

# Joseph

## Introduction:

Expectations and reality are often at odds. If Joseph were here, he'd respond to that statement with one word, "truth." Our two lessons go hand-in-glove. The Isaiah text is one of the prophecies that tell about Jesus long before his birth. The Matthew text is how that prophecy was fulfilled.

When we look at the Isaiah text, it should be noted that this prophecy was to be fulfilled twice. Once within the lifetime of King Ahaz. However, it's deeper meaning for all people of all time would be fulfilled hundreds of years later with the birth of Jesus. His birth would be a miracle, an intervention of God into the normal ways of life.

This intervention from God, was to Joseph an interruption of what he expected in life. His fiancé is pregnant. At first Joseph took this to be a betrayal. He wanted to be kind, but he was struggling, and he decided to dismiss Mary. This is when God intervenes once more. He sends the angel to comfort and explain. Joseph listens, changes, and responds to his call.
