# Living On A Prayer - Job's Prayer of Anguish

#### Introduction

Job's prayer is like an elaborate poem cursing the day he was born because of all his hardships. It paints a picture of a faithful and patient man coming to the end of his endurance and asking God a question we can probably all relate to: Why?

The book of Job raises some tough questions, like why do bad things happen to good people?

Unfortunately, we don't get a satisfying answer, but we do get some assurances. We can be sure that God hears us, will respond, and is working in the details.

Job had reached his limit, and then he reached out to God. His prayer is an example of how we can cry out to God no matter what is going on in our lives, even if our suffering causes us to ask *why*. We may not understand why we face challenges and suffering, and we may not be able to see any good coming from what we go through, but "we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him..." (Romans 8:28), and God is greater than your questions.

After Job prayed his prayer of anguish, God showed up. He came in a storm and showed Job the awe-inspiring and overwhelming intricacies and details of the universe He created and oversees. This storm probably wasn't how Job expected or hoped God would answer his prayer. We don't always get the answer we expect or hope for when we pray, but we can always be sure that God is listening and working in the details.
